## **Wound Treatment:**









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A VetBlue PVA Tunnel dressing was used in place of a Penrose drain. The tunnel dressing was sutured in place, leaving ends exposed to allow drainage. This also allowed the owner to monitor the color and hydration of the dressing.







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The VetBlue PVA Tunneling dressing was easily extracted with the sutures in place.

Dressing had changed in color from blue to white indicating heavy bioburden.

Wound went on to heal with no recurrence of an abscess.
